Sheffield people speak out about their Musculoskeletal conditions.

In April 2015 we conducted some research into people's experiences of using Musculoskeletal (MSK) services in Sheffield. This covers services treating problems with bones, joints, muscles and tendons.

We gathered information from over 100 people. We also held a focus group to talk through some of the specific barriers to treatment, and what would have helped people to manage their condition better.

Musculoskeletal Report (cont.)

What did we find?

The majority of people did not feel they had to wait too long to access services.

While most people we spoke to did receive information on self management and pain control, most of those didn't think there was enough.

Most people knew where to go and who to speak to in some circumstances, but not all. A worrying 32% of people reported not knowing what to do if they needed urgent help with their condition.

72% of people who accessed an MSK service in primary care, and 80% who saw a MSK specialist, told us they received no information or support on the emotional aspect of their condition.

Patient journeys highlighted specific barriers to people feeling better, many of which would have been simple to resolve if identified at the time.

What did we recommend?

We made a number of recommendations, including the introduction of an advice leaflet on the emotional aspects of an MSK condition, and the production of small credit card sized emergency contact cards so that people always know where to turn in an emergency.

What next?

We will be keeping an eye on the new MSK Sheffield service as it develops (it started on 1st April 2015) to make sure that it does meet the needs of the people it serves, and that the things people told us about in this report have been addressed.


Spotlight on Volunteers

Annual Report 2014/15

One of Healthwatch's statutory powers is to carry out 'Enter and View' visits of health and social care premises. These can be either announced or unannounced.

The visits are to observe the nature and quality of services, and to see and hear how people experience the service. We also collect the views of patients, residents, their relatives and carers. In the past couple of months we've visited 5 care homes and have published the reports on our website.

Findings from Enter and View visits are collated as evidence-based feedback and reported to the service provider, Care Quality Commission (CQC), the local authority, NHS commissioners and quality assurers, Healthwatch England and other relevant organisations.

As a result of one of our Enter and View visits, we raised a concern with the Care Quality Commission over a potential fire risk. The CQC then visited the premises, agreed with our concerns, and asked the provider to take action to remove the risk, which has now been done.

NHS Sheffield Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is asking local people to share their experiences and thoughts about the city's urgent care services, as part of a review into how and why people access them.

'A 2020 vision of health and social care'

The NHS in Sheffield and Sheffield City Council are running an engagement exercise over the next few months to talk to people across the city about the challenges that the health and social care system faces, and how we respond to these challenges.

This should lead to a view of health and social care in the year 2020 that is shared by organisational partners, the public and clinicians, enabling health and social care organisations to then work together, with the public of Sheffield, to implement the changes.

The challenges

Sheffield has an ageing population and is seeing a rise in long-term conditions such as diabetes and arthritis. Set against a backdrop of less money, due to the expected continued reduction in funding for councils, and the increasing cost of providing care, it is important to make changes now to ensure we have a system fit for future demand.

Aims for the next five years

- Reducing the need for A&E attendance and emergency admissions by 20%.
- More local specialist diagnosis and management of health problems, making best use of technology, reducing hospital outpatients attendances.
- Single assessment for long term care and pooled health and social care budgets, helping people stay at home where possible, and reducing placements in care outside Sheffield.
- Development of specialist services in Sheffield to provide care to South Yorkshire and wider populations.
- Reducing the gaps in life expectancy across the city.
- Quality of care and patient experience must continue to be improved.

Launch event

The CCG and the Sheffield Health and Wellbeing Board held the first 'A 2020 Vision of health and social care' event in May, which was fully booked within just three days.

At the event guests heard about the challenges and the CCG's aims, and took part in interactive voting and a lively facilitated discussion.

'A 2020 vision of health and social care' (cont.)

Most people in the room agreed that there are challenges, with 95% of saying they recognise some of the challenges the health and care system faces, and 54% strongly agree that services can't just do more of the same.

Attendees were also asked 'Would these ideas improve things for us or the people we know?' In response 66% said yes, but 25% were not sure. More information about the event can be found here: https://storify.com/sheffieldhwb/sheffield2020care-event

Have your say! Non-urgent Elective Care

Pharmacies to have access to Patient Summary Care Records



After a pilot project by 27 pharmacies in Sheffield, it is expected that the scheme will be extended to allow all pharmacies in the city to access patients' Summary Care Records.

Summary Care Records hold details of your prescribed medication history, as well as any allergies you may have (such as an allergy to penicillin etc). They don't contain any other confidential information or details of your medical history.

The pilot project has been very successful and has helped to improve the care provided by pharmacies. The benefits include: increased patient safety, a reduction in the need to refer patients back to their GP to clarify the prescription, and it's also cut down the time spent by the pharmacist having to ring the surgery to speak to a GP.

Mental Health Partnership Board

1 in 3 of us will experience a mental health condition at some point in our life. People with severe mental health problems have 4.1 times the overall risk of dying prematurely than the general population aged under 50 years. Furthermore, people with severe mental health problems face increased risk of physical health problems, including diabetes, hypertension, coronary heart disease and cardiovascular disease.

The objective of the Partnership Board is to provide strategic leadership and promote partnership for the development and maintenance of high quality mental health services in Sheffield. The Board has an oversight of mental health services generally, but with a main focus on services for adults of working age.
